



‘S - S’

We use this form when we want to indicate possession. It can be used with three groups:

People
Animals
Time

That is John's book
This is the dog's ball
A one week's holiday

We use the ‘S’ with:

<i>Singular regular nouns:</i>	boy	boy's
<i>Singular irregular nouns:</i>	man	man's
<i>Plural irregular nouns:</i>	men	men's
<i>But with plural regular nouns:</i>	boys	boys'

We use this form in these circumstances:

1. **That is John's house** (*the thing "possessed" is immediately after*)
2. **That is my house this is John's** (*to not mention again a noun previously mentioned, "house"*)
3. **I must go to the mechanic's** (*with many names of professions there is no name for the place where they work so this form indicates "the place where ***** works"*)
4. **Tonight we will go to John's** (*the place where John lives, sometimes also works*)
