

Comparative Superlative (2)

When we compare to things that are equal we use this construction:

$$Sub1 + verb + AS + adj + AS + sub2$$

Today is as hot as yesterday He will be as intelligent as her

When we compare two things that are not equal, maybe more or less, we use the following form:

$$Sub1 + verb + adj(comp) + THAN + sub2$$

Today is hotter than yesterday He is less intelligent than she.

With regard to the last example we can clearly see that the last word is a noun and that it is a subject. Modern English usage accepts "her" as it "sounds" better, though the correct form is **SHE**, but this does not "sound" right thus we normally put an auxiliary verb after it, the example now becomes:

He is less intelligent than she is.
